

Recreation and Aesthetics in Southland Park



Southland Park is maturing as a community with a diverse demographic of people from different backgrounds and at different stages of life. The types of dwellings in our community are also diverse and include single family homes and condominiums that were built starting in the 1980s and into the 2000s.

A maturing community faces the challenges of mitigating the obsolescence of infrastructure, including recreational infrastructure, and deteriorating aesthetics.

The Southland Park Residents Association is taking action to meet these challenges by making the community a more vibrant place for current residents and enhancing the community's attractiveness and value to prospective new residents.

A survey of the community indicated that the enhancement of our greenspace is a priority for Southland Park residents. In response, the Residents Association continues to work to ensure the maintenance and improvement of the greenspace's aesthetics and recreational infrastructure support an active and healthy lifestyle for all residents.

Southland Park's existing recreational infrastructure includes the walking path along the storm retention pond and the children's playground equipment. In 2019, the Residents Association instigated changes to the parkland and walking path alongside the pond to mitigate the negative effects of large numbers of geese, making the path and park more user friendly in the warmer months of the year. In the current year, volunteers have already cleaned the sand around the children's playground structures, weeded the boulevard on Royal Mint Drive, and planted wild-flowers in the greenspace. Work has also started to remediate the Southland Park sign at the entrance to our community.

In 2020, the Residents Association also began planning and fundraising for a dual-purpose half basketball / pickleball court. This dual-purpose court, to be built in the parkland, will provide children, teens and adults, including more senior adults, with convenient options to engage in sporting activities. Building this type of infrastructure in Southland Park is particularly important for our resident children and teens as it provides them with recreational amenities without requiring them to cross Lagimodière Boulevard or Fermor Avenue to neighboring communities.

Construction of the half basketball / pickleball court is expected to cost between 75 thousand and 100 thousand dollars. To-date, the Residents Association succeeded in obtaining a grant from the City of Winnipeg for \$36,965.60 towards the project. Letters of support for the project

have been submitted by Shawn Nason, City Councilor – Transcona Ward, and Audrey Gordon, Member of the Legislative Assembly for Southdale.

Planning and fundraising for the project will continue into 2021 and hopefully construction of the structure will be completed in the same year; in time to allow Southland Park residents to enjoy playing basketball and pickleball while some warm weather still persists.

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Winnipeg's Real Estate Market - Pandemic Effects

As you may know, real estate is a very local subject. News on how Toronto or Vancouver markets are reacting to the pandemic is entertainment at best, but completely irrelevant. Unless you are moving to those cities, what happens there has absolutely no effect on our own housing market.

How has Covid-19 effected our market? You might be surprised! As with any type of 'market', real


estate revolves around the principle of supply & demand.

Supply:

At this time of the year, Winnipeg typically has around 1600-1700 houses available for sale.

On Nov 1, 2020, that number was a historical low of 955.

That is a 40% drop in available homes!



Why are home sellers deciding against listing their homes this year?

I believe that some homeowners feel the market may be negatively impacted by the pandemic. Perhaps they are afraid that buyers are holding off on making a purchase or a moving decision.


That is simply not the case, as you can see below.

Demand:

During October, 2020, 672 home buyers purchased a house in Winnipeg.

That is an INCREASE of 57% over the same time period in 2019.

The biggest increases occurred in luxury homes, (those listed at over \$500K) which more than doubled in sales.



Low Supply + High Demand = Bidding Wars

40% fewer homes + 57% higher sales = Sellers Market

Home buyers in Winnipeg appear to be undeterred by the pandemic. Interest rates are at an all-time low and home ownership is cheaper than renting. Unfortunately, they are not finding as many homes on the market as last year.

This has created a very hot sellers market, in nearly all price ranges up to around 400K. Luxury Homes have always been a much slower market in Winnipeg. I don't see that changing anytime soon.

Southland Park Market:

Since real estate is a 'local' subject, how are we doing in Southland Park over the past 6 months? Provincial laws prevent us from identifying addresses and publishing sold prices, but here are the highlights.

From May 1st to October 31st, there were 7 houses listed in this time period.

The results were:

- 1 listing was withdrawn after 31 days
- 1 home sold at well-over asking price
- 2 homes sold at full asking price
- 3 sold at under asking price

One of these took 110 days to sell. Another took 50 days. The remaining 4 sales all took less than 10 days to sell.

Price range was between \$375,000 and \$590,000.

What will the immediate future hold?

Normally, the market slows down in November / December, but that may not be the case this year. With such a severe shortage of listings on the market, buyers will probably continue their search.

In my opinion, Winnipeg will continue to be a strong sellers market in the near future.

We are fortunate that so many residents in Southland Park have pride of ownership and take care of their yards. We live in a community where we come together to take on improvements for the

betterment of all of us. The small efforts of keeping your lawn cut, the boulevards maintained and picking up after our animals are appreciated by everyone.
